Hello Everyone,

Next year our Education Department will be focussing on further establishing Hybrid Learning across our Public Education System to assist with easing the staffing shortage and ensure country

students have access to curriculum to support their pathways. Hybrid Learning is the term being given to blended learning programs that are delivered through a combination of online lessons and face to face contact with teachers. The Eyre Peninsula schools have been doing this through our Local Delivery Program for the past twenty years, we have the most mature Hybrid Learning program in the state. I have led the Eyre Peninsula Local Delivery program during this time and next year will be seconded into a new 12 month role: "Principal on Assignment - Country Education" to lead the development of Hybrid Learning across the state. This will mean that I will be temporally replaced in 2025 to perform this role, processes have now begun by our Education Director, Tammy Williams, to appoint a replacement Principal. This has been a difficult decision for me, as I love leading Streaky Bay Area School, however the opportunity to be able to lead a strategic state wide initiative that will positively impact many country schools and students is something that I cannot pass by. I have negotiated to continue to work out of Streaky Bay Area School next year and will be available to provide advice and support to the incoming Principal.
