## SENIOR SCHOOL NEWS

We are proud to announce that Chloe Foster has been selected as one of 20 South Australian rural students to become a Rural Youth Ambassador for 2025. This program empowers young leaders to advocate for the needs and aspirations of rural students. Chloe's passion for making a difference demonstrated through her Wellbeing Wagon initiative over the past 12 months, and her involvement in the senior school Your Voice Matters Team for 2024 and 2025, have earned her remarkable opportunity. We wish her all the best in her new role and are confident she will represent our school well.

We understand that the anticipated email containing the traffic lights for parents and students was not sent out at the end of Week 4 as planned. We apologise for any inconvenience this has caused. The delay is due to an issue with the Accelurus program, which is currently being addressed. We are working to resolve this matter and hope to provide you with the updated traffic lights by next week.

Research shows that after leaving school, students are expected to be independent and self-regulated learners. However, many may not be fully prepared for this transition. The SACE Board is currently renewing all subjects and is committed to developing a new curriculum that:

- Connects learning to real-life experiences
- Provides opportunities for student choice and decision-making
- Expands the types of evidence students can present
- Helps students understand and manage their own learning
- Supports the development of essential skills

Some students naturally develop these skills, especially those who have faced challenges, self-reflected, and shown personal growth. However, not all students have the chance to master these skills.

Metacognition, or understanding how one learns, and self-regulation are strong predictors of success. It is a crucial part of the toolkit students take from senior school into the world. The SACE Board's goal is to ensure all students develop these skills, enabling them to identify and evaluate effective learning strategies and apply them across various subjects. This approach aims to better prepare students for future challenges and opportunities.

This year, the SACE Board has introduced an exciting new Stage 2 (Year 12) subject called Activating Identities and Futures (AIF) where metacognition and self-regulation underpin the subject. This innovative subject, which has been successfully piloted in recent years, has replaced the compulsory Stage 2 Research Project (RP).

AIF allows students to explore a personal area of interest through self-directed inquiry. Schools and teachers involved in designing the subject have shared positive feedback, noting both immediate and long-term benefits. Participants felt energised by studying topics of their choice, enjoyed stronger relationships with their teachers, took greater control of their learning, and applied their new learning habits to other subjects.

This subject offers young people on the brink of adulthood the chance to demonstrate initiative and showcase their knowledge and skills. AIF is part of a broader effort to ensure that SACE remains a modern and responsive qualification for a changing world—a passport to success.




#### YR 7 ART
